Mary Wilson, 56, enjoyed a distinguished 20-year career in the British Army as a psychiatric nurse. In 2009 she survived an attack on her life when a Taliban fighter ran her off the road, leaving her with multiple injuries. Mary remained in the army even after a diagnosis for multiple sclerosis in 2004, but was medically discharged in 2012. Since then, she has overcome her many health challenges to become a hugely successful Paralympian athlete. Mary says: When I was discharged from the army I fell into a black hole. But after a couple of months my inner strength kicked in and I knew I had to get on
